Over a century ago, for the first time in religious history, Bahá'u'lláh, the Founder of the Bahá'í Faith, in announcing God's purpose for the age, proclaimed the principle of the equality of women and men, saying: "Women and men have been and will always be equal in the sight of God. The establishment of equal rights and privileges for women and men", Bahá'u'lláh says," is a precondition for the attainment of a wider unity that will ensure the well-being and security of all peoples". The Bahá'í Writings state emphatically that "When all mankind shall receive the same opportunity of education and the equality of men and women be realized, the foundations of war will be utterly destroyed."

The Baha'i vision of equality between the sexes rests on the central spiritual principle of the oneness of mankind. The principle of oneness requires that we 'regard humanity as a single individual, and one's own self as a member of that corporal form,' and that we foster an unshakable consciousness that, 'if pain or injury afflict any member of the body, it must inevitably result in suffering for all the rest.' Baha'u'llah teaches that the divine purpose of creation is the achievement of unity among all peoples.



14. A Struggle for Gender Equality: Dr. Dagmar Berne 1865-1900

Dr. Dagmar Berne was the first woman to study medicine in Australia, gaining entry to Sydney University in 1885. Her story is one of a struggle for gender equality at a time when medical doctors were men, some of whom jealously guarded their territory. In the previous decade, a British doctor had written in the London journal 'Reproductive Medicine' that women should not be allowed to enter the profession of medicine, declaring that they lacked the necessary brain power because their "skulls were smaller". They could, he thought, become sterile if they attempted to work in such a difficult discipline.

This male prejudice was evident in Australia, where male doctors defended their domination of the profession by suggesting such views that childbirth was "so gruesome that women would faint" if they had to witness it.

The Dean of Sydney University, although opposed to the idea of women medical practitioners, did admit that the Faculty of Medicine had an excellent female student who had been studying medicine for two years and whose presence had "neither inconvenienced nor embarrassed male students or teaching staff". Her name was Dagmar Berne.

Dagmar was the daughter of a Danish father who had sacrificed his own life while attempting to save a drowning man in the Bega River in New South Wales. Her mother remarried, but on the death of her second

husband took Dagmar and her other seven children to Sydney where Dagmar attended a private school. In spite of her love for the sciences, she was taught dancing, deportment, conversational French and needlework.

Arriving at Sydney University, she studied Arts before changing to Medicine and gaining honours in botany, chemistry, zoology and anatomy in her first year. The Dean, it is written, did not want woman to qualify. In spite of exhausting weeks of study, Dagmar would look for her examination results on the notice-board to find that her name was never on the pass list, in spite of the fact that men with lower marks had succeeded. Her biographer, Susannah De Vries, writes that Dagmar would tell her mother in despair, "Mama, I've failed again...sometimes I think they don't want me to pass."

After four years of hard and intensive study at Sydney University, Dagmar realized that male prejudice was too strong and that she would not qualify there. In fairness, it should be said that despite her intense dedication, she may have struggled at times because of her lack of access to secondary education in science subjects.

Encouraged by Britain's Dr. Elizabeth Garrett Anderson, she moved in frustration to London to continue her studies, working at the Royal Free Hospital and finally qualifying as a doctor in 1893, when she began work at the North Eastern Fever Hospital in Tottenham.

But those London years took their toll on Dagmar's health: her family's fortunes had declined and she had been forced to live in damp accommodation in a London basement and to subsist on little food. She suffered continuing bouts of pleurisy and pneumonia.

In 1895 she returned to Sydney and set up a medical practice in Macquarie Street. Unfortunately she died of tuberculosis in 1900, at the age of thirty-five.

Today approximately half of the students in Australian medical schools are women. The Dagmar Berne Prize is now presented each year to the female graduate with the highest marks in final year Medicine at Sydney University.

Junior Youth Groups

Developed for youth between the ages of 12 and 15, these programs are designed to empower and equip young people with the knowledge and concepts that will encourage the expression of their personal potential, and develop the skills and attitudes necessary to become agents of change - for themselves and their communities. Through engagement in service initiatives, artistic and extracurricular activities they foster a sense of world citizenship and a lifelong commitment to serve humanity.

The junior youth spiritual empowerment program is open to young people aged between 11 and 14, and assists them to navigate through a crucial stage in their lives.

Those in their early adolescent years possess altruism, a sense of justice, eagerness to learn about the universe, and a desire to contribute to the construction of a better world.

The program helps them form a strong moral identity and empowers them to contribute to the well-being of their communities and the world at large.

By developing their spiritual qualities (virtues), their intellectual capabilities and their capacities for service to society, the participants come to see that they can become agents of positive change in the world.

The program adopts a participatory mode of learning where the facilitator and participants learn from each other.

Groups of participants engage in activities such as artistic expression, discussion, drama, cooperative games, study of literature, story telling and acts of community service.

The junior youth program explores themes from a Baha'i perspective, but is not a formal religious education program. It is open to all, subject to parental approval. Junior youth groups meet on a regular basis and there is no written homework.

All program facilitators are certified under the Baha'i Child Protection Policy, which includes a mandatory police check. Parents are welcome to meet with the facilitators to learn about the program.

Study Circles

The Bahá'í Community is offering a series of life-changing circles of study.

The purpose of Bahá'í study circles is to provide participants with the knowledge, spiritual insights and skills to enable them to contribute to the betterment of society, starting with their own neighbourhood. This is done through systematic study of a sequence of courses based on the Bahá'í Writings using the courses of the Ruhi Institute. The first in the sequence of books is called Reflections on the Life of the Spirit. It examines spiritual matters such as prayer, meditation, life and death and the development of the soul. Study circles are held all around Australia and are open to all. You are invited to take inspiration from the Bahá'í teachings, benefitting from whatever gems of wisdom and knowledge will help you to address the challenges you face. Study circles are held in an uplifting environment conducive to spiritual empowerment of individuals, who come to see themselves as active agents of their own learning. The role of the study circle facilitator is not to impart knowledge, but to assist discussion. Study Circles feature participatory learning, involving discussions with others and the use of the arts.
